
Stewardship

From Concept to Reality: State-of-the-Art Medical Building Made Possible with Generous Donor Support

The Kirk Kerkorian School of Medicine at UNLV now has its first permanent building thanks to the philanthropy of the Nevada Health and Bioscience Corporation (NHBC).

Less than two years after the groundbreaking for the five-story, 135,000-square-foot structure took place, UNLV celebrated the completion of the Kirk Kerkorian Medical Education Building, which will support the advancement of medical education in Southern Nevada and anchor the burgeoning Las Vegas Medical District.

Flexibility is a key feature of the building. While the school's class size is now 60 students per

class, the building is designed to serve classes of up to 120 students. In addition to classrooms and patient rooms, the building features a learning resource center, a wellness center, and community spaces for lectures and events.

"In addition to providing a space to train physicians, the building should be a catalyst for attracting new biomedical and pharmaceutical companies to our community," said Dr. Marc J. Kahn, dean of the medical school. "It's another step in helping our region diversify its economy and serve the needs of the ever-growing Las Vegas Valley."

Dear Crankstart Foundation,

Being chosen for your scholarship filled me with hope! I cried when I read the email - it was a weight off my shoulders. Thank you for recognizing me.

As a non-traditional student, at times I've felt like I'm lagging behind my peers and that I should have finished school a long time ago. (That's what society tells me anyway.) With this scholarship, I feel seen and validated, like I'm exactly where I'm supposed to be.

I've been in recovery for post-traumatic stress disorder for three years, and part of my healing has been reconnecting to a sense of purpose. Trauma can rob you of who you are. But school can be an antithesis to negative self-talk and the unworthiness that comes with PTSD.

I believe education is a bridge that can ultimately reconnect people to society in a way that is truly meaningful. It's a form of self-care.

Because of you, I am that much closer to my goal of becoming a mental health nurse practitioner and helping people who have lived through experiences like mine.

More than anything, I want to make a positive impact on the world.

Lied Library Study Room Named for a Jeopardy! Champion

The Brayden Smith Memorial Group Study Room acknowledges the time the alumnus spent studying at Lied Library

Brayden Smith spent many hours tucked away in a group study room on the fifth floor of Lied Library – studying for classes, mentoring friends, watching political and legal lectures, and preparing for his law school entrance exam.

Lied Library was also where Brayden '20 BSBA Economics prepared to fulfill one of his lifetime dreams: competing on the popular game show Jeopardy!, where he became a five-time champion.

After Brayden passed away in 2021, his family wanted to honor his commitment to learning. His parents, Scott and Debbie Smith, and Brayden's friends noted that he'd spent much of his time at UNLV in Lied Library.

The Brayden Smith Memorial Group Study Room was dedicated in September 2022 — Brayden's

26th birthday. Funding for the dedicated room was made possible by the many generous donors to the Brayden Smith Memorial Fund. The funds will also be used to support students in the Flora and Stuart Mason Undergraduate Peer Research Coaches program, and to purchase resources for collections in the libraries.

"This room is tucked away and unassuming, but has the capacity for so much, just like Brayden," Debbie Smith said.

"It's an honor to know that Brayden's time in this library helped him complete his degree and gave him a sanctuary to study," said Maggie Farrell, dean of Libraries at UNLV. "We hope that this area that Brayden treasured will inspire future generations of UNLV students."

The Culture of Philanthropy Runs Strong with UNLV Alumni

One of the most gratifying roles of being a graduate is supporting scholarships for other UNLV students. With state and federal aid only able to accommodate a portion of our growing population, UNLV alumni can be proud of the millions of dollars in scholarship support they have provided.

Eugene Wrotny was the proverbial millionaire next door. Smart with his money, not flashy or pretentious, he lived a respectable life and then left UNLV an extraordinary gift.

Born and raised in New Jersey, Wrotny served in the U.S. Air Force and was stationed at Nellis Air Force Base. He graduated from UNLV in 1973 with a degree in business administration and never forgot his alma mater.

In 2019, Eugene gave \$10,000 to UNLV Athletics. But his most generous gift was to establish an endowed scholarship through his estate.

The scholarship was funded with more than \$2.4 million from the estate after Eugene passed away in November 2021.

Thanks to Eugene's foresight and desire to make a difference, the Eugene J. Wrotny Scholarship Fund will generate \$100,000 annually in scholarship support to UNLV students in perpetuity.

"I was raised in a single-parent household on every type of government assistance possible," Victor said. "My father was not present, and in my early teenage years, my mother became victimized by drug addiction. A college education at UNLV seemed like the only viable option for what I felt was a desperate situation. I viewed college as a way to make it out of poverty."


With a little help from a UNLV-sponsored high school outreach program and a whole lot of perseverance, Victor overcame all the hurdles in his path and earned his undergraduate degree. That degree — and all that went into completing it — literally was a life-changer.

That's why, 30-some years later, Victor remains an unabashed UNLV supporter. "I had an adolescence that was not very stable or loving, but the people connected to UNLV made me feel valuable, cared for, and important. This university is a huge reason for my success; writing a check is merely an acknowledgment of my appreciation."

UNLV Food Pantry Expands Program to Feed Local Community

On the second Saturday of the month, in the parking lot in front of the Stan Fulton Building on Flamingo, you'll find cars lined up to pick up almost forty pounds of food apiece. The service is open to anyone who needs support and requires no documentation.

Since 2010, the UNLV food pantry has been providing food to students, staff, and their families in need. In March of 2022, to support these efforts and in collaboration with Three Square Food Bank, a monthly Farmers Market event was launched to support anyone in the community.

The UNLV food pantry was initially launched to provide canned goods to students and staff in need. This resource remains critical, as shown in a recent survey where 1 in 5 UNLV students reported experiencing food insecurity. Since that time, the experience and food provided by the pantry have improved significantly.

In 2021, UNLV acquired space, a convenience store adjacent to the university, to create an inviting store-like experience for visitors.

The new space includes refrigeration, which allows the pantry to provide healthy foods including fresh fruits, vegetables, meats, and dairy. Much of the produce is grown and provided by the UNLV Community Garden.

All of this growth in the Food Pantry program has been made possible by the generous support of our community, including recent grants from MGM Resorts Foundation and Albertsons/VONS Foundation. It is also one of the most heavily supported programs by faculty/staff.





Clearing the Path to Law School

Emily Espinosa knew she wanted to become an environmental justice lawyer when she graduated from the University of Nevada, Reno. But as a first-generation student with no family ties to the profession, the chasm between aspiration and attorney felt daunting.

"Law school seemed so unattainable," Emily said.
"I didn't know where to start, but I knew I wanted to go to Boyd, specifically for their commitment to community service."

Then she stumbled upon the Justice Michael L. Douglas PreLaw Fellowship Program while scrolling the William S. Boyd School of Law's website. "It was talking about diversity and helping students like me who really didn't understand the background or the process," she said.

Emily enrolled in the PreLaw Fellowship in January 2021, and today, she is a second-year law student who recently received an award for her community service.

"I owe absolutely everything to this fellowship," she said. "I don't think that I would be in law school without it."

Named after the first African American justice of the Nevada Supreme Court, the Douglas PreLaw Fellowship is designed to help diverse and first-generation students prepare for law school through a week of simulated

classes and LSAT preparation. The fellows also visit Nevada courts, firms, in-house counsel, and public interest organizations to meet lawyers and judges where they work.

The program's per-student cost is \$2,500 and is entirely funded by private donations, including gifts from law firms, individuals, and others.

With community participation, student success – and donor support – the school is excited to watch the Douglas PreLaw Fellowship Program grow, and for even more students to find their purpose in a career in law.

Lecture Series Continues to Inspire

After a two-year hiatus during the pandemic, the UNLV community enthusiastically welcomed the nationally recognized Barrick Lecture Series back to campus. Deepak Chopra presented "The Future of Wellbeing," discussing consciousness, expanding capacity, and physical, emotional, spiritual, social, community, financial, and ecological health.

Series founder Marjorie Barrick made a lasting impression on UNLV and Las Vegas. After moving to Las Vegas in 1951 with her husband, Edward, she played a vital role in supporting education, social programs, and the arts.

In 1980 Marjorie established an endowment in memory of her husband to fund the Barrick Lecture Series at UNLV. She selected many notable early speakers for the lecture series, including President Jimmy Carter, Carl Sagan, and Mikhail Gorbachev.

She was a founding member of the UNLV Foundation Board of Trustees and sat on many community boards, including the Nevada Ballet Theatre and the Variety Club. In addition to the lecture series, Marjorie established the Barrick Distinguished Scholar Award, the Barrick Travel Fund, and the Barrick Fellowships for Graduate Assistants.

Marjorie was often honored for her devotion and philanthropy throughout the community. Recognitions include the Governor's Arts Award, the Distinguished Nevadan Award, Nevada Dance Theatre's "Woman of the Year" award, and an honorary doctorate in humane letters from UNLV. In 1989, UNLV's Marjorie Barrick Museum of Art was renamed in her honor.

UNLV Students Explore the State Beyond Las Vegas

Last summer, 14 UNLV students gained new perspectives on social issues across the state. Thanks to a generous donation from Nevada Gold Mines operated by Barrick, they discovered that Nevada's landscapes are as beautifully diverse as the many people who call it home.



Endowment Establishes the Pam Quirk Brain Health and Biomarker Laboratory

Ted and Maria Quirk established an endowment to create the Pam Quirk Brain Health and Biomarker Laboratory (Quirk BBL) within the Department of Brain Health at the UNLV School of Integrated Health Sciences. The gift was made in memory of Ted's sister, Pam, who tragically succumbed to Alzheimer's disease.

Researchers in the Pam Quirk Brain Health and Biomarker Laboratory are developing blood tests to indicate whether a person is at risk for a neurodegenerative disorder such as Alzheimer's or Parkinson's. These sophisticated tests will one day reveal if a healthy person is at risk for future disease, whether or how the disease is already progressing, and if treatment plans are working or need to be adjusted.

This critical work is possible in Las Vegas – and at UNLV – because our world-class researchers have amassed a large bank of patient blood samples and assembled some of the most advanced laboratory equipment in the world.

This is life-changing for patients and families alike.

We already know, for example, that several other conditions and diseases – including inflammation and diabetes – may increase the risk of developing Alzheimer's. But what else impacts the brain's health?

That's one of the important questions being explored today in the Pam Quirk Brain Health and Biomarker Laboratory.

UNLV Libraries Designated as U.S. Patent and Trademark Resource Center

The UNLV Libraries Patent & Trademark Resource Center, Powered by Switch is the result of a partnership between UNLV University Libraries, the UNLV Wiener-Rogers Law Library, and Switch. The designation continues to center UNLV at the heart of economic development in Las Vegas and Southern Nevada and furthers the university's Top Tier mission in socio-economic development and community partnerships.

Switch has partnered with the UNLV Libraries to partially fund the PTRC, pledging a generous gift for the establishment of the PTRC office in Lied Library, as well as supporting training and programming for services offered by the United States Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO).

"This investment and the opening of this office will pave the way to simplify patent processing for many entrepreneurs and emerging companies across the growing business and technology sectors in Nevada," said Betsy Fretwell, EVP of Strategy at Switch.

The UNLV Libraries PTRC will focus on student and faculty innovation providing advanced patent searching capabilities and instruction, and will also be available for community entrepreneurs who want help accessing USPTO services.





Fall 2022 Student Statistics









Thank You for Helping Us Imagine the UNLV of the Future

Thanks to the enduring support of UNLV donors and critical funding from the state of Nevada, a new Advanced Engineering Building is taking form on the north side of the university's main campus. The 52,000-square-foot facility will enable the Howard R. Hughes College of Engineering to meet its skyrocketing enrollment demand and create a highly skilled workforce that will boost economic development in Nevada.

Since the building was proposed by College of Engineering Dean Rama Venkat nearly a decade ago, private individuals and companies have championed its construction. To date, \$9.7 million in donations has been pledged. The Nevada State Legislature approved \$36.8 million to cover 50% of the current cost. UNLV will provide matching funds.
